## REQUEST FOR CONTRIBUTION

In the last committee meetings three topics have been identified as being important to the future of our club and worth discussing in separate groups with the aim of producing suggested advice or recommendations for decisions to be made by the committee.

The main reason why the construction of discussion groups was chosen is because the outcome of subsequent decisions arising from these discussions could, significantly, alter the charter and/or functioning of our club. Hence the broadest possible support base is sought for.

Therefore, I would like to ask all our members that would like to participate to step forward and join one or more of these discussion groups. You can do this by calling or e-mailing Dawn (see contact details in this issue). Discussions will start early next year with outcomes expected before the next AGM.

I mentioned these three topics briefly in the last Double Dutch but here they are again with a slightly larger outline:

#### **Membership structure**

With the dawn of internet, social media and various other electronic community based activities, participation in one of these groups has changed. Alongside the classic "membership" other mutations such as 'distribution list", "friends", "mailing list" or "followers" have been introduced

all with a, more or less, different take on commitment and financial contribution.

As with many things in life, in order to judge and decide you need to quantify and the easiest way to do that, at least for a club, is by quantifying interest.

Question for discussion is: what structure fits our club best and what commitment and financial participation goes with that structure?

#### Separate committee for the younger generation

Our club covers a wide range of member age-levels. Interest in activities and events across that range is not the same.

Question for discussion: would the club, in general, benefit from a separate committee for a younger generation who could operate autonomously but under the Dutch Club Wellington umbrella in order to assure access to assets the club has?

#### Liaison

Marketing, promotion, alliances with other clubs or organisations and sponsoring (both giving and receiving) are means of liaison with peers in the immediate environment. Usually these aspects create a playing field for what we would like to have (e.g. footprint or funds) and what we can offer (e.g. assets or funds).

Question for discussion: Do we have sufficient liaison and if not how can we improve existing and/or create new?


