Annie Heeremans



A life well lived – and shared with many

Ninety-year-old Annie Heeremans is a foundation member of the Netherlands Society of Rotorua. Active and engaged with life, Annie still drives herself to all the regular club events including bingo, coffee mornings, market days and pot luck dinners.

From a family of seven, Annie was born in IJmuiden, north-west of Amsterdam, in February 1929. The family suffered greatly during WWII; even eating tulip bulbs and the occasional cat to survive. They were forced to move several times after the German army requisitioned their family home. It was a plus when Annie became friends with a nice boy who lived in the same street in Santpoort. Unfortunately, like all young men in Holland, Frits was required to serve two years in the military and was sent to the Dutch East Indies (now Indonesia) during the war. Afterwards, he felt there was nothing for him in Holland and wanted to live somewhere he and his girlfriend could have a future. Annie initially said no to leaving, but the thought of being parted from Frits for another two years convinced her otherwise.

Their options as assisted immigrants were Canada, South Africa, Australia or New Zealand. Although Annie loved New Zealand from the very first, she admits she had never heard of it beforehand.

Just a week before they were due to sail, Annie's mother decided it wasn't seemly for her to leave without being engaged. With virtually no money apart from a small inheritance from Annie's grandfather (to help towards Frits' mechanic's tools) and £10 from the Dutch army (to cover expenses on the 6-week voyage), Annie's mother brought the engagement ring and her outfit was made by her sister Hetty. In fact, she sewed several outfits that Annie recalls were all far too hot for the New Zealand summer.

Arriving in Rotorua in 1953, the pair worked at jobs organised by the Government; Frits as a mechanic at Waipa Sawmill and Annie as a chambermaid at the Princes Gate Hotel. It was a live-in position with meals provided and Annie thought she was "in heaven".

She was amazed to find New Zealanders so open and friendly. She was stunned when her workmates invited her to play tennis; only the rich played tennis in Holland. Running to St. Michael's Catholic Church for her first Sunday service, she was offered a lift in a car (and thereafter every Sunday); another big surprise as wealthy car owners didn't give poor people rides either.



Two of her three sisters, Ina and Hetty, came out to New Zealand for Annie and Frits' wedding in St. Michael's Church in February 1955, with Hetty sewing both the bride's and bridesmaids' dresses. The sisters also fell in love with New Zealand and made Rotorua their home too.

Renting a Waipa Sawmill house in their first year of marriage, the couple moved into town when Frits got a job at RM Transport as a truck mechanic. The company subsidised their rent and later, as a mark of the high regard Frits was held in, the money they'd paid in rent was gifted back providing the deposit to buy the house. Amazingly Annie still calls it home today.

The Rotorua Netherlands Society, formed in 1965, played an important role in the Heeremans' lives from its beginnings. Along with Daan Ingelse, a major force in the club's formation, the social couple got involved in organising dances at the Buffalo Hall to provide a gathering place for local Dutch immigrants. They also had film nights showing newsreels from Holland supplied through the Dutch Embassy.

Keen for a permanent venue, the group fundraised and worked hard to make that happen. Tapping into the talents of their tradesmen members as well as voluntary labour from non-tradespeople, hall construction of the "Dutch Club" began in 1982; officially opening in 1986.

The couple enjoyed 47 years of marriage "doing everything together," before 73-year-old Frits passed away in 2002. Annie has three children, Marilyn, Joanna and Frits. Joanna, better known to club members as Jo Harvey, is the only one who still lives in Rotorua.

It has been a full, happy and community-minded life for Annie. She often played the good Samaritan to those newly arrived from Holland, taught sewing on a voluntary basis at St Michael's Primary and worked part-time at a variety of jobs while the children were young. They bought Ngapuna Dairy in 1970, and Annie still gets a thrill when folk greet her as "Mrs H" as it means they are old customers from the 18 years she and Frits ran the dairy. Her generous spirit shows when she mentions that, while they didn't offer credit, "she always made sure there was food for the children".

Annie loves family life and has become adept at using her iPad to stay connected to overseas family. Apart from club activities, she also maintains her large garden, cooks, bakes, and regularly hosts mahjong.
