



Unfortunately due to Covid the bike rides did not go ahead during the first Dutch Week in 2021.

In Memoriam Jose Nijstad.

Yoka Saris:

I arrived from Wellington 32 years ago not knowing many people in this city. And at first I felt rather lonely without my family and friends.

How José heard about this I don't know but one day she turned up at my place and after a short conversation she suggested I would start a coffee morning with Dutch ladies.

When I told her that I did not know many in Christchurch José said to leave that up to her.

"You set the date and make sure you have coffee and something to eat and I'll get the girls."

Well, she did. I hardly had enough chairs but said José: "At least you have enough to eat!" That morning we chatted and laughed a lot. The coffee club lessened my loneliness for quite a while.

After some time I got a job at the Dutch Consulate as Migration Officer.

There together with the Consul's secretary, Mayo Oorthuys, I set up the Christchurch branch of the Friendly Support Network.

We gave aid to the many Dutch migrants who where in need of all kind of things, such as



translating diplomas, job references; finding work; home rentals but most often giving support with the battle against homesickness.

José, of course (who else), was our number one woman to help us out as a volunteer at the FSN.

She was an amazing support organising to clean the homes of mostly little old men, who she always cheered up with her boisterous jokes.

One day, when José was unable to attend this certain old gentleman's housework, he rang me and asked if next week he could have 'the big lady' again, the one who told the great jokes.

He told me he really liked her as he did not even have to put his hearing aid in. He could clearly hear every word she said!

José was also at hand at all times during the time when the FSN had to take care of a family with quadruplets. The mother had to take one of the girls to the Netherlands for an operation and the Father, who had just started his own business, could not always be there to take care of the other three babies.

The FSN members did what they could but José became the stand-in mother. She worked tirelessly for a long time for this young family.

I wonder sometimes if these parents still remember José and all she did for those little ones.

These are but a few memories. All of you here in Christchurch know that José was the queen of the Dutch Club's kitchen; the cleaner-upper; the wiper of tears when things got on top of some people. José was always there with her special 'bear-hugs' and tea-towel to wipe our faces.

How we laughed, when she got older and went from a sweet soprano voice to a dusky alto and when that became too much she did a stint as a bass singer with the men!

José was known for her loud voice but more-so for her heart, which was as big as Texas. Nobody was ever sent on his or her way when they came to ask her for help.

So to the Nijstad family I like to say you can be proud that you are related to this very special lady.

And all others, myself included, we thank José for all she has done, we will miss her because ladies like José don't come around very often.

And....if you are listening up there, José, don't forget to keep telling them your corny jokes!!!

Automatisch verlies Nederlanderschap mogelijk vanaf 13 jaar i.p.v. 10 jaar

Korte maar wel belangrijke mededeling: waar het automatische verlies van het Nederlanderschap tot voor kort mogelijk was na 10 jaar, is deze termijn recentelijk opgerekt naar **13 jaar.** Zoals <u>bij</u> <u>Everaert Advocaten beschreven</u> staat: 'Dit betekent dat je tot 3 jaar nadat je Nederlandse paspoort is verlopen de kans hebt om een nieuw Nederlands paspoort te verkrijgen zonder dat je Nederlanderschap gevaar loopt.'

Dubbele nationaliteit in het regeerakkoord

Gepubliceerd: 17 december 2021

In het nieuwe **coalitieakkoord** is een passage opgenomen over meervoudige nationaliteit en behoud van het Nederlanderschap:

"De **Rijkswet Nederlanderschap** leidt in sommige situaties tot onwenselijke problemen. We herzien het automatisme waarbij Nederlanders met een meervoudige nationaliteit buiten het EU grondgebied (na 10 jaar) hun Nederlanderschap verliezen en maken het voor hen makkelijker het Nederlanderschap te behouden naast hun andere nationaliteit of, voor degenen die het na 1 april 2003 verloren, te herkrijgen."

Het lijkt erop dat de nieuwe regering soepeler zal willen omgaan met dubbele nationaliteit, waardoor Nederlanderschap bij langdurig verblijf in het buitenland makkelijker kan worden behouden en minder snel kan worden verloren.

We kijken uit naar de uitvoeringsstrategie die in de loop van 2022 van de staatssecretaris verwacht zou mogen worden. Vervolgens zullen debatten over het onderwerp uiteindelijk moeten leiden tot een voorstel voor een wetswijziging. Het is te hopen dat er nu echt iets gaat gebeuren op dit gebied en dat ook de modernisering van het nationaliteitsrecht uit het regeerakkoord 2017-2021 wordt opgepakt, en dat dubbele nationaliteit mogelijk maakt, ten uitvoer wordt gebracht.

Overigens is in oktober 2021 een wetsvoorstel aangenomen om de automatische verliestermijn op 13 jaar te zetten. Dit betekent dat je tot 3 jaar nadat je Nederlandse paspoort is verlopen de kans hebt om een nieuw Nederlands paspoort te verkrijgen zonder dat je Nederlanderschap gevaar loopt. De nieuwe wet treedt in werking met ingang van 1 april 2022.

Everaert Advocaten zal zich blijven inspannen om een bijdrage aan het debat te leveren en om het onderwerp dubbele nationaliteit op de politieke agenda te houden.



AANVAARD & VOLBRACHT! Grondwet wordt gewijzigd!

Stemmen voor Eerste Kamer vanuit buitenland wordt mogelijk



5 juli 2022

Wat in 2015 met een motie op het D66-congres begon, eindigde vandaag, zeven jaar later, met een overwinning voor en erkenning van de rechten van de Nederlanders buiten Nederland: nota bene in de Eerste Kamer zelf werd vanmiddag de laatste horde geslecht om de grondwet te wijzigen.

Met die wijziging staat de weg open om Nederlanders buiten Nederland voortaan óók voor de Eerste Kamer te laten stemmen, op indirecte wijze, net zoals Nederlanders binnen Nederland. Met meer dan de vereiste tweederde meerderheid van de 75 kamerzetels (54 voor, 21 tegen) werd het wetsvoorstel vandaag aangenomen. Een groep SNBN'ers – letterlijk vanuit de hele wereld – was ter plaatse aanwezig, onder leiding van bestuurslid Jan Joosten, in SNBN ornaat.

Rond kwart voor twee 's middags lokale tijd was het dan zover: de stemming – de allerlaatste horde.

De politieke partijen die de Nederlanders buiten Nederland die vóór stemden waren: OSF (1), PvdA (6), GroenLinks (8), D66 (7), PvdD (3), Fractie-Otten (2), ChristenUnie (4), CDA (9), VVD (12) en 50PLUS (2)

Tegen waren: Fractie-Nanninga (7), SP (4), PVV (5), SGP (2), FVD (1) en Fractie-Frentop (2)
