Koffiemorgen with the Ambassador

Prior to Koningsdag, members of the Dutch Club were invited to a morning tea on 21 April at the newly refurbished residence of the ambassador, Mr Ard van der Vorst, in Wadestown. A small group took the train from Lower Hutt and met up in Wellington with other club members and 13 of us proceeded in taxis to Wadestown. We were greeted by the ambassador, who was flanked by his magnificent Rhodesian Ridgeback dog. Maartje Thorn and other embassy staff members were there also to greet us and share the morning tea in the former ballroom.

Mr van der Vorst gave a short speech, telling us about the residence and the role of the Ambassador and Embassy which serves not only New Zealand, but many Pacific Islands. The house was built by the Norwood family, whose legacy lives on in the Lady Norwood Rose Garden as well.



We also got a short quiz about the various flags on display – the flags of the countries that comprise the United Kingdom of The Netherlands (Nederland, Aruba, Curaçao and St Maarten) and the European Union flag.

The residence has some interesting new furnishings, all by Dutch or Dutch/Kiwi designers. One of the aims of the refurbishment was to use recycled or upcycled materials, and energy-efficient lighting. We saw very modern and comfortable chairs with frames made of beech wood and the seats from material using recycled soft drink bottles (Maria Tulp pictured in one), and lamps made from re-purposed glass dishes and plates.

I particularly liked the wallpaper in the library; this was designed to reflect the muted colours the old masters used. I also liked the mirror in the dining room (inset), and the photos by Ans Westra that decorated one wall.

We all enjoyed this morning at the residence and the coffee and delicious orange cupcakes. We thank our Ambassador Ard van der Vorst for the invitation, and for giving us such an informative tour of the residence.

Annual General Meeting

On Sunday 21st May we held our Annual General Meeting (AGM) in Avalon House. It was good to see many members turning up for the meeting. As a matter of fact, this was the largest assembly of members for an AGM in my time as chairman.

After meeting formalities, an overview of the past year was presented followed by the results of the financial review. As a special topic the results of the recent questionnaire on what, how and where to celebrate our 75th anniversary was shared. (See opposite page.)

Main points from the meeting were:

- Regular events are well attended and enjoyed by our members.
- Tulip Sunday was cancelled last year due to bad weather.
- All other one-off events enjoyed good visitor numbers, most notably Sinterklaas which drew a record number of children this year.
- Membership numbers are steady.
- The club has a good Internet presence and communication.
- Contract negotiations with the council are ongoing.
- Members will continue to enjoy sponsored events, using available funds.
- The club is in a good financial position.

- The current committee members all agreed to being re-elected for next year.
- We are celebrating our 75th anniversary this year!

Results of the Anniversary questionnaire

To find out when and how our club should celebrate its 75th Anniversary a questionnaire (on paper and electronically) was issued to all members with the following particulars:

- Issued with March-April Double Dutch.
- Requested responses by 25 April.
- 12 Questions on the following topics:
 - Transportation & mobility.
 - Frequency, duration and type of event(s).
 - Location of the event(s).
 - Other ways to commemorate.
 - Cost of the Anniversary celebration.

In total, 28 members replied to the questionnaire. The following overview is a compiled summary of the answers:

- All respondents want to celebrate our anniversary with an event.
- Half prefer using their own transportation (52%), while a third prefer the club to arrange it (34%).
- Half are happy to walk (50%), while the other half are not (19% no walking and 19% only a short walk).
- Most respondents would like to see one big event being organised (67%), a few prefer a summer and winter event (22%), and even fewer more than one event (11%).

- The vast majority would like a Food & Drinks event (88%), some with entertainment (34%), nobody was interested in an activity event (0%).
- Most respondents said that the event should take between half and full day (64%); there was little interest in a multi-day (3%) event.
- Where: External venue (35%), Avalon House (32%), no preference (32%).
- Most popular "other" types of commemoration are: a news article or book (42%), and a gift of some kind (34%).
- As for the budget, the majority (73%) voted for "As much as it takes".

From a list of specific suggestions earlier suggested by members, the following five topped the list of votes:

- 1. Lunch/dinner at Wallaceville House (15).
- 2. Tour/lunch at a Martinborough winery (13).
- 3. BBQ at the clubhouse (12).
- 4. New sign for Avalon House (10).
- 5. Cossie club event with entertainment (9).

The committee will take these results into account when allocating a budget for the celebration and start planning (an) event(s) in the coming month. You will be kept abreast with the progress of this via the Double Dutch or intermediate Newsletters. Anyone interested in more details on the results of the questionnaire can contact me.

Koningsdag + Orange Bike

For the second year running, the Dutch Club's Koningsdag celebration was run – or should that be 'pedalled out' – in conjunction with the Orange Bike Hutt Valley cycle promo event. This family-friendly event was one of more than a dozen "Orange Bike Rides" promoted by the Netherlands Embassy – and organised by local communities – around New Zealand for the third annual Dutch Week. Activities included a children's confidence course, free bike checks, bike promotion material from Waka Kotahi, Hutt City Council and Greater Wellington, and the Orange Mystery Trail – a series of 16 puzzling questions put together by Pierre.

A highlight of this year's event was Netherlands Deputy Ambassador Maartje ten Brummelaar coming along with her family, and leading the crowd of 70 or so cyclists round Avalon Park on the Orange Bike Parade ending with prizegiving at Avalon House. This was compered by Pierre, with Saskia Knibbeler providing an assessment from the Judges, and the Deputy Ambassador handing out prizes. Thanks go also to Ben Lokum for providing live music on his ocarina and leading us in singing the Dutch national anthem 'Het Wilhelmus'.

More than 70 cyclists officially registered and took part in the event, with others just turning up. An

estimated over a hundred people came through the gates of the Dutch Club to join in the festivities. We didn't have the Montfoort poffertjes van this year, but their stroopwafels were popular with young and old alike. People definitely want to see Orange Bike as a regular event, not just for the Dutch community, but for Hutt Valley cyclists as well.

'Senioren Doen Mee' research

(An edited version of an invitation to participated in research on aging by the University of Amsterdam.)

Are you 55 years old or older? Have you emigrated from the Netherlands to New Zealand? Then you may be eligible to participate in online research project revealing unique insights into various factors contributing to healthy mental aging. The online study aims to map out how older people organize their lives and how this affects their life quality and late-life resilience.

By participating in the online study, your information will help us to develop evidence-based interventions promoting healthy mental aging, thereby contributing to a resilient society. You will also help us understand the factors that promote mental wellbeing in later life, and enable a unique comparison of these factors between aging in the Netherlands and aging in New Zealand.

You are eligible to participate if you...

- Are aged 55 or older,
- Have a reasonable command of the Dutch language,
- Don't have a diagnosis of Alzheimer's Disease or dementia,
- Are able to operate a computer/laptop/tablet independently.

As a thank you for participating, you will receive a brochure with scientifically-based advice to promote healthy aging. We will also eventually share the results of the research in our newsletter.

This year Denise, one of our latest members, added to that by presenting us with two stunning Easter-themed collages. (see below)








In this happy atmosphere we enjoyed hot-cross buns and many varieties of Easter eggs.

Een stukje Nederland midden in Nieuw-Zeeland

In February, we were visited by a Dutch Journalism student visiting New Zealand, and wanting to talk to Dutch migrants about their experiences. Since then, Nathalie Kobus has written an article, which she has shared with us in Dutch and English, over these pages.

In een oud boswachtershuis, iets ten noorden van de stad vind ik de Dutch Club Wellington, die al bijna 75 jaar bestaat. Het gebouw staat wat verborgen tussen de bomen, maar desondanks is het niet te missen dankzij de Nederlandse vlag die aan de vlaggenmast wappert. In de tuin word ik begroet door een van de leden en tevens de tuinman van de club, die de planten water geeft. We kletsen even en hij wijst me de weg naar binnen.

Meteen bij de ingang kom ik een enorme gele klomp tegen, met daarin bloemen en een Nederlandse vlag. Op de koffietafels liggen blauwwit geblokte tafelkleedjes, Delfts blauwe potjes met daarin tulpen en lepeltjes met daarop Holland, Dokkum en windmolens. Voorzitter Pierre introduceert mij aan de groep en ik klets met wat leden van de Dutch Club. Ik spreek onder andere met Ann Beyk, erelid van de club. Met een advocaat met slagroom in de hand vertelt ze over haar reis naar Nieuw-Zeeland, haar familie en het klaverjassen, dat ze elke dinsdag organiseert. De meeste gesprekken zijn in het Nederlands, maar ook aanhang van de Nederlanders en Nederlandse kiwi's zijn aanwezig. Zo ontmoet ik ook Carolina Hofman, die kroketten staat te bakken. Ze is een Kiwi, maar voelt zich een echte Nederlandse.

Ik vraag de Nederlanders waarom ze de club en mede-Nederlanders opzochten. Voor de gezelligheid en de gemeenschap, is het gedeelde antwoord. Terwijl de kroketten en advocaat rondgaan en iedereen lekker aan het kletsen is, kijk ik rond. Veel van de leden vertrokken in de jaren '50 uit Nederland hierheen en de meesten kijken zonder spijt terug. Veel kwamen hierheen met het idee dat ze nooit terug zouden komen. Het was simpelweg een moeilijke en vooral veel langere weg terug naar Nederland in die tijd. Velen gingen pas 20 jaar na aankomst voor het eerst terug om

familie te bezoeken. Eenmaal daar was er veel veranderd. Het was er druk en vol. In Nieuw-Zeeland hadden ze ondertussen hun leven opgebouwd met een baan en een familie. Velen hebben kinderen gekregen, die ook af en toe wat Nederlands hebben geleerd.

Ik vind het mooi om te zien hoe verschillende mensen samenkomen in de Dutch Club en om naar hun verhalen te luisteren. De gedeelde Nederlandse identiteit brengt ze bij elkaar, maar de gezelligheid (en misschien ook wel de kroketten) maakt de club een succes. Het is een bijzonder stukje Nederland aan de andere kant van de wereld.

A piece of the Netherlands in the middle of New Zealand

In an old forester's house just north of the city, I find the Dutch Club Wellington, which has been around for 75 years. The building is somewhat hidden between the trees, but it is nevertheless impossible to miss thanks to the Dutch flag waving on the flagpole. In the garden I am greeted by one of the members, who also happens to be the gardener, who waters the plants. We chat for a while and he shows me the way inside.

Immediately at the entrance I come across a huge yellow clog, with flowers and a Dutch flag in it. On the coffee tables lay blue and white checkered tablecloths, Delft blue pots containing tulips, and spoons with Holland, Dokkum and windmills on them. Chairman Pierre introduces me to the group and I chat with some members of the Dutch Club. I speak, among others, with Ann Beyk, an honorary member of the club. With an 'advocaat' with whipped cream in hand, she talks about her trip to New Zealand, her family and the 'klaverjassen' she organizes every Tuesday. Most conversations are in Dutch, but also partners of the Dutch and Dutch Kiwis are present. That's how I also meet Carolina Hofman, who is baking 'kroketten'. She is a Kiwi, but also really feels like a true Dutchie.

I asked the Dutch why they joined the club and find fellow Dutchies. For fun and community, is the

shared answer. While the 'kroketten' and 'advocaat' go around and everyone is chatting nicely, I look around. Many of the members moved here from the Netherlands in the 1950s and most look back with no regrets. Many came here thinking they would never go back. It was simply a difficult and, above all much longer, way back to the Netherlands at that time. Many returned to visit relatives for the first time in 20 years after arriving. Once there, a lot had changed. It was busy and full. In New Zealand, meanwhile, they had built their lives with a job and a family. Many have had children, who have also learned some Dutch now and then.

I really like seeing how different people come together in the Dutch Club and to listen to their stories. The shared Dutch identity brings them together, but the 'gezelligheid' (and perhaps also the kroketten) makes the club a success. It is a special part of the Netherlands on the other side of the world.

Thank you for the hospitality and thank you to everyone I had the opportunity to speak to and photograph!


