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

MEETING DUTCH NEW ZEALANDERS



Introducing Hans van der Voorn

Born in July 1954 in Zeist, my father's family is from Utrecht and mother's family from Zeist.

Unusually we were living with my mother's family with my two parents and two young children in quite a small house with a lot of other people. That was the incentive to emigrate to NZ.

My father was a bricklayer, mother a homemaker. We arrived in NZ in May 1956 on a ship called SS Waterman, my older sister and I were 3 and nearly 2. The 4 subsequent siblings were born in NZ.

We were briefly with family in Warrington, Otago after we arrived but soon moved to Balclutha, where there were quite a few Dutch people. My father started a bricklaying business there in partnership with his brother. There is a long history of building and bricklaying in the family in and around Utrecht. They were very good at their trade and did ok, albeit with some initial prejudice at the time. It was quite a change for them coming from a city in Nederland to a small town in NZ in the 1950s, but they adapted fairly quickly. We were very close to my uncle and aunt, but she passed away very young at the age of 39.

We grew up not speaking Dutch much, definitely not once we started school. That was the notion at the time. Recently I've set about learning it on Duolingo and am finding the basic vocabulary relatively easy to recall but am poor at the grammar. I travel to Nederland regularly for work, and while everyone speaks English well, they appreciate it if I make an effort to also speak Dutch.

I wound up getting a degree in civil engineering at Canterbury University, and spent the early part of my working career in construction at Downer &Co, including being project engineer on the Chatham Islands Airport.


I met my wife Patricia in 1982, and got married in 1983. We lived in the UK for a couple of years, came back to Downer in Wellington in 1986 then had 2 children, spent some time in Invercargill, then went back to Wellington. I left Downer in 1994 to start an energy company called Nova Gas, which was later sold to Todd Energy and became Nova Energy. At around the same time as we sold the company, my wife had secondary breast cancer so I retired early, travelled a bit with the family, before she passed away in late 2002.

My current company here is called Izon Science and we've worked closely for a long time with Amsterdam University's Medical Centre, AUMC.

We grew up with bikes and as a child we did some quite big rides. I started riding recreationally in 1999 in my mid 40s to get some exercise, initially road riding with a Wellington group. My first serious bike was a titanium framed Litespeed, which seemed good at the the time, but is now well behind modern technology. Since then I've branched out into many kinds of riding and own about 8 bikes at the moment. I spend more time mountain biking now than road riding. Among other things I have the only life pass at the Christchurch Adventure Park, where I ride regularly.

Other bike riding things I've done are hill climbing events called Everesting, where the aim is to bike up and down the same hill until you've accumulated the height of

Mt Everest. It needs to be done all at once, no going home for a sleep. One version of this is to climb 10,000m instead of Everest's 8,848. Twice I've had the world record for being the oldest person to do the Everest 10,000. The last time I did that was 54 laps of Clifton Terrace in Sumner. I lost that record a few years ago and haven't decided if I should get it back or not.

Another bike riding diversion is called Wandrer Earth, where the aim is to ride as many different roads and streets as possible. The attached map of Christchurch shows the roads I've ridden in blue and not ridden in red. The system covers the whole world, and is handy when visiting a new place or country.

I have a new goal which is to break the world chainless record, which is to ride a flat course with no chain (so you can't pedal). It's done on a pump track and the current record is 50km, held by a kiwi professional living in Canada. Pumping means you stand on the pedals and use your body weight to go up and down the little rises and falls. When I read about him doing it, I thought that by using my Everesting experience I could probably break that myself. It's a different action to pedalling and uses more energy per km. I'm aiming to do that in March at the children's pump track in Manchester St, near the Margaret Mahy Playground. I need to measure the course accurately but going by my GPS, 60km will be around 700 laps and should take about 4.5 hours. I'll be raising some money, by getting sponsored per lap, to buy bikes for ChCh children who otherwise wouldn't have one. My local bike shop is helping me to get those bikes partly sponsored by one of the bike manufacturers. I've

started serious training now. Before the holidays I was just trying it out. Next week I aim to get up to 20km, then work my way up every week until I can do the 60km. The difficulty is managing the training while children also want to use the track. Often they are really young 2-3 years old, so that gets a bit messy. Going earlier in the day before they arrive seems to be the best way.

To have the world record ratified means that I need to get the course accurately measured with a survey wheel, and then use an electronic race timing system to count the laps. Ideally we will have a screen showing the lap number, time and distance.

I think the CCC will be supportive because it's good for Christchurch also it promotes cycling and good for children to be introduced to riding in a safe environment and to see what's possible.

Delfts Blue: A traditional Dutch pottery style, representing centuries-old craftsmanship and artistry.

The logo's design incorporates a water element, symbolizing the historical connection between the two countries, and the intertwining shapes signify a balanced, strong and enduring partnership.

Bee Problems

Several people asked me: "Why does a beekeeper burn his hive?" and "What is American Foulbrood?"

Hier is een kort antwoord op beide vragen;

A TV news item, some time ago, showed a beekeeper burning a beehive because of American Foul Brood.

American Foulbrood (AFB) is a very serious disease caused by the bacterium paenibacillus larvae.

This bacterium produces millions of spores that germinate in the gut of baby bees, the bee larva.

The result of that infection is that bee larvae become a slimy mess and die, so no more brood in the hive.

This disease can be treated with anti antibiotics, several countries do that, but not in NZ, our honey has to be kept pure. In NZ beekeepers have to report the infection and within 7 days the infected hive (s) with all the hive ware on it has to be burned.

To do that, the hive lid is lifted, pour 1/2 ltr petrol into the hive, kill all the bees (can be as many as 50,000), close the hive again and prepare the burning within a week.

AFB spores can stay alive for more than 50 years, they resist all chemicals and cannot be killed with hot water.

Some beekeepers are unlucky and lose more than 100 hives or even 1000.

There is a possibility to make the woodwork sterile again with the treatment called: Wax Dipping. In a big container the wax (paraffin) needs to be heated to 160 deg. C and all the wooden parts need to be kept in the wax for 10 mins. The beekeeper can start again with a new family of bees.
